Definitions and Behaviors

Consent Affirmative indication by words and/or actions of a clear and voluntary agreement to engagein a sexual act. Consent for one sexual act does not constitute consent to all sexual acts. Consent can be withdrawn at any time. Consent cannot be obtained through force, threat, intimidation, or coercion Silence or absence of resistance does not indicate consent Consent cannot be given by some one who is incapacitated due to drug or alcoholcon sumption

RedFlags "They went further than I wanted to," "They were being really pushy, so I just didn't say anything, but I didn't want to," or "I said no but they ignoredme."

Sex-basedHarassment.Behaviors in the form of unwanted sexual advances, requests and other verbal, written, or electronic communications for physical conduct of a sexual nature. This includes actions that create a hostile environment based on someone's sex, gender identity, or sexual orientncona sn 0 Tc 0

Dating/Domestic Violence. Violence committed by someone against a complaint while the two are in or share a romantic or intimate relationship with one another. Examples of a romantic or intimate relationship are current/former spouse or intimate partner; someone with whom they share a child in common; a person cohabitating with them as a romantic partner or spouse, etc. Violence includes but is not limited touse or attempted use of physical or sexual abuse, patterns of coercive behaviors (verbal, psychological, economic, and/or technological).

Red FlagsUnexplained physical injuries, abnormal flinching at movements, "Please don't tell them, they'll get so mad at me," "I'm not sure what they'll do next," "Oh, I can't buy lunch, my partner doesn't let me eat with other people," or "I can't wear that, they wouldn't like that."
